

EDITORIAL

Shortly after the cancellation of the Ben Nevis Race, Peter Brooks of Lochaber was quoted as saying that most runners were prepared to take the risk of dying in bad conditions in a fell race. Put in those bald terms I wonder how many would agree, and yet I feel that, perhaps without realising it, most runners do take that risk. How many of us go out training alone on the hills without telling anyone where we are going? How many of us have gone off-course in a race and wondered what would happen if we broke a limb? How many of us have disregarded organisers' safety regulations? How many of us have been pig-headed and carried on in an event when packing in would have been the most sensible course of action?

So we do take risks - certainly with our limbs and I reckon with our lives too. However, we take risks driving cars, crossing roads, and other events in our daily lives. Surely we are free as individuals to take those risks.

A race organiser, too, is free - to stop us taking those risks, to allow us to take them, and, at times, unfortunately, to encourage us to take them. Looking back at the 1980 season, the Carnethy course was changed(officially!) for safety reasons, the Ben Nevis was cancelled for safety reasons and the Moffat Chase was almost cancelled for safety reasons. On the other hand, the Blisco Dash was run in mist, the day after a flood, with no summit checkpoint and no mountain rescue. (The organiser said "We didn't feel it right to ask a marshal to go up there in those conditions".) Earlier in the season a supposedly safety conscious organiser was heard to say about a runner still unaccounted for "Oh, he'll be D.K.".

Obviously, both runners and organisers are free to do as they wish and some take more risks than others. It would be difficult to formulate and to apply universal rules to solve this problem, but the question of responsibility remains. I reckon the organisers have a responsibility to maintain certain minimum safety requirements, and the runners have a responsibility to work with them and not against them. Many of the restrictive rules in the Three Peaks race were brought in because of the organiser's personal agony at Ted Pepper's death, and who can blame him? Len Prater was a worried man, until the last Competitor finished the Moffat Chase, and who would not have been? We must understand the organiser's viewpoint.

Who, then, decides minimum safety requirements? And who enforces them? What sanctions can be used against individuals and organisers who flaunt the "rules"?

I don't know, but I do know that if the Fell Runners' Association becomes the governing body of fell running it is going to have to face these issues. I feel that it is almost certain that someone else will die in a fell race in the coming years, but do we have to wait for that to see significant action?

The first Kinder Downfall Race attracted a field of 129 men and women, and 42 boys and girls in the junior events. The senior course follows a route well known to ramblers - it was along these paths that the 'Mass Trespass' of 1932 took place, where five men were jailed for their part in trying to obtain access to all moorlands, a right we all now enjoy.

CHARLEST AND TON ANTING COURSE.

Initially the route follows an obvious path by the side of the reservoir before climbing steeply up Williams Clough and onto the Kinder Plateau. Contouring along the edge via the Downfall is fairly obvious in clear conditions, apart from the last section to Edale Cross where the marshal reported that runners were arriving from many different directions. The descent to the finish is fast, well flagged and involves a short road section. Several of my friends and I use this course as a training run and we consider that the race can be won or lost (for those in contention) by picking the best route from a wide band of paths and sheep tracks that run along the edge of the plateau.

The race this year followed the unusually dry spring with the Kinder moorlands being closed for several weeks in May. These conditions led to some very fast times, with Andy Darby leading through all the checkpoints and winning in a time of 63.35.

Unfortunately several runners had to drop out through injury with the Kinder Mountain Rescue Team doing a superb job in getting one runner with a broken kneecap off the mountain.

The race begins near the Horse Close Hotel and after a short stretch of road begins to climb on tracks and footpaths to White Stone Peck, the summit of Skipton Moor (also visited in the Rombalds Moor Race), whence a circuit is made of the moor top to shortly rejoin the outward route. This is a different course to the professional race, which was run a few days previously. Harry Walker triumphed in the amateur race with a time of 22.20, 20 seconds ahead of Wayte of Bingley, while local athlete Derrick Lawson was the first veteran, home in 11th position out of 76 starters. There was also a ladies race, won by Jayne Dransfield of Spenborough in 30.24. G Metcalfe (Skipton) won the youth's event in 25.13 and D Ridings (Sale) the intermediate ladies' in 13.45. There were also six other junior races, and the fine weather made it a grand day out, with the prize giving taking place in the Horse Close pub, where the ale flowed freely.

Conditions were excellent for this year's race, with a following wind on the five mile ascent, and with a strong field assembled it was felt that Bobby Shields year-old record of 72.15 might be threatened. Ballahouston's Sandy Daly started very fast and at one point had over 200 metres lead on the initial two mile road climb. He continued to go well on the hill section to the summit but was caught half way up by Mel Edwards who reached the summit in 45.45 followed at 70 metres by Shields and his clubmate Ron

Campbell. These three, who had fought out the finish of the 1979 race (7 seconds covering them at the end) interchanged positions on the descent, but with $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles to go Lochaber's Roger Boswell dashed into the lead, and only Campbell could respond. However, the Welshman gallantly held off the challenge to take his first Cairngorm title, with Campbell second and Shields dipping lower at the tape to take third place from Edwards. Sandy Daly was a fine fifth at the first attempt at the race and Walter Ryder was first veteran in eighth place. Lochaber with 1, 2 and 3 narrowly took the team race!

We reported last year that Billy Bland was arranging a snack bar at Esk Hause to keep him on his legs for the last few miles. (What we didn't report was that he later offered to pay the passer-by whose Mars bars saved his life - pay for the cost of the Mars bars that is).

Well, this year, Billy had his own private snack bar at Sty Head, and he certainly needed it.

He and Andy Styan had got away from the pack off Whin Rigg and across to Greendale, but whereas Billy didn't slow any going up Seatallan, Andy did and was caught by Bob Whitfield and Colin Donnelly (running his first Wasdale). Billy forged into the mist round Scoat Fell and came straight through to Pillar. The following three went into the same mist, went onto the top of Scoat Fell, nearly to Steeple, and ended up, more by luck than judgement, on the path to Pillar. A pleasant detour, but from being ninety seconds behind Billy, they arrived at Pillar eight minutes behind. Here Colin's reconnoitring of the course the previous two days began to pay dividends - not for him, but for Bob and Andy - Colin was knackered. Andy, fired with anger at getting lost in the mist yet again, charged away from Bob and after Billy. The gap at Great Gable was 6 minutes, at Sty Head 4 minutes, at Esk Hause 3½ minutes, at Scafell Pike 2½ minutes, but the snack bar stop was keeping Billy's legs alive this year and he

finished 77 seconds ahead, 7 minutes outside the record. Andy Styan is negotiating with the organisers for an extra mile to be added to the course.

Ray Aucott continued his fine season to take the first veteran's award in eighth place, and first supervet Alan Heaton did well to finish only two minutes behind superwoman Pauline Haworth.

SNOWDON - RAS YR WYDDFA

19 July

A significant continental challenge in the form of a crack Italian team added spice to the 5th annual Snowdon race. The weather did not play ball however, and the visitors and other first time Snowdon ascenders were denied the splendid summit view. From Cloggy station to the summit and back it was a case of gritting teeth against the biting wind and rain and get the hell out of it as quick as possible.

The day belonged to P Pezzoli, who, having established himself a commanding lead at the summit, wasted no time getting down to arrive at the carnival field finish nearly two minutes ahead of Sale Harrier Andy Darby, with another Italian, A Guipponi third.

Italians filled 7th, 12th, 13th, 15th and 44th places, with Swiss runners 16th and 68th, Canadian road runner Brian Stewart 83rd and a Frenchman 136th. The winning time was relatively slow (weather?) and left Ricky Wilde's 1978 record of 1.04.28 intact for another year.

The veterans were well up, as we have now come to expect with T Davies (Aldershot and Wales) in 18th place, followed by P Watson in 28th(77.08) and Wade Cooper 31st(77.24). Eight ladies braved the elements and again the previous fastest time was broken, together with local runner Joan Glass's domination of the race, by Pauline Haworth of Keswick in a time(85.18) which placed her 70th amongst the men. Locals Joan and Bridget Hogge had to be content with 2nd(90.48) and third(93.05) with Gillian Pile of Manchester in 4th place(94.18).

Judging from the number of entries and the performances, the local club Eryri Harriers are thriving. Apart from the ladies, the

juniors dominated their race, and the club managed one runner in the first 20 in the men's race and 16 finishers.

An interesting feature of the race was the start. After enduring a tedious but persistent starter/referee's instructions with the usual impatience of runners and comments like 'get on with it' and others less printable, whilst the rain peed down, the referee shut up and the band started to play leaving us to guess how many verses were to be endured before the magic gun was fired.

That race organiser Ken Jones and his enthusiastic helpers and many sponsors had put a lot of effort into the event was plain to see. In addition to the free Mars bars, Victoria Hotel hospitality (reduced accomodation rate for runners and families), they topped it all by producing a full printed result sheet and photos by 10 p.m. that evening (5 hours after the finish).

There were 179 finishers in the men's race, not a big field by today's standards, but quite enough, and a tribute to the sport which can now happily stand three such events on the same day.

THE LOCHABER THREE

Billy Bland staked a firm claim to the 1980 Fell Runner of the Year championship by winning both the Melantee and the Half Nevis by wide margins. In Bland's absence, Harry Jarrett disposed of some useful opposition to win the Cow Hill.

The Melantee is filed at the tough end of Category "A", and so after some early pace making from Messrs. Mike Bishop, Andrew Darby, and Dic Evans (Speed Men), it was not surprising to see Billy Bland, a pure fell runner if ever there was one, take the lead. Bland went on to win by over a minute, but was still a long way off Alan McGee's 1978 record of 29.43; but boy, was it a hot day. Jarrett was not troubled in finishing second. Despite moving up from 9th to 3rd on the descent (thanks to 16 off 50mm spikes in his footwear), Boswell couldn't stop Darby going through in the mire at the bottom of the hill to take third.

10th in a foul mood (he had a rubbish descent), came Ronnie 'Cammie' Campbell. Cammie is famed for his elbows. Seemingly no-one told Dic Evans about them, and sure enough, as the pack surged through the park gates at the start of the race, one of them caught poor ole Evans. Evans unwisely mentioned the incident to Cammie as they headed for the hill. Cammie, not in the greatest of humours, re-raised the matter after the finish, suggesting some barbaric method of settling the matter. Evans decided to forget about it, muttering something like "Is this sport?".

Everybody was back next day for another dose. Jimmy Saville was there to ensure good weather - but he left the last few hundred feet in the

clouds to add a bit of interest. Bland got off to his usual leisurely start, before putting the boot in just past the first zig-zag. He soon dropped all his pursuers and finished just outside his own record (50.23, 1979). He might have broken it had the half way turn point been in the right place; but unfortunately, the marshal, not knowing himself where the exact location of the turn is, had decided to wait and see where the leader turned off, and then stand there. Bland a basically honest bloke, didn't want to turn until he'd found the marshal. Catch 22. The result - the whole field ran an extra 50 to 100 yards. (Except John Blair-Fish, he compensated for the extra distance on the hill by running 5 yards inside the track at the finish.)

Jarrett was good enough to hang on to 2nd. Cammie looked a good bet for 3rd; at the turn he was 4th, and went past Broxap going down the grassy slope. But Broxap was running a cool race, and latched on behind. Just before the top stile at Achintee, Boswell caught them both, and all three hit the car park together. It was a question of who had the best road legs. Broxap; he just exploded down the road for 3rd place.

No records broken yet; but on Monday, due perhaps to a spectacular fire that razed the top of Cow Hill a few months before, no fewer than six runners finished inside the existing record. More likely it was a soft record - Andy Styan, 19.06, set it in 1978.

Dic Evans and Mike Bishop set the early pace, then Jarrett took over to finish well clear with a classy run. What a scrap there was for second. John McGee, Evans and Bishop hurtled down the Town Hall Brae as one man, and became embroiled in an almighty sprint-out down the High Street, which was surprisingly won by McGee. The smallest feller in the race, Scot MacMillan (Lochaber) ran inspired to finish 13th (1st junior) in 20.52. Peter Brooks was 1st vet, 14th in 21.02; at last showing signs of recovery since suffering plenty in the cold, wet Duchy of Cornwall marathon.

There are youngsters races on all three days, so this year, don't just bring the fancy piece; bring the kids as well. On Saturday there is a full programme of track races at the Lochaber Highland Games, while on Sunday and Monday there are short hill races for boys and girls.

Talking of fancy pieces, Bridget
Hogge was a clear winner of the
ladies' Melantee, while Ros Coates
walked off with the Half Nevis,
with Caroline Brittan 2nd and
Bridget Hogge 3rd. Bridget said
she wasn't feeling any after effects
from the Melantee - who's she
trying to kid? Ros stuck around
to clean up in the Cow Hill.

IAN ROBERTS MEMORIAL RACE

4 x 4 mile Fell and Road Relay

This event was staged by Holmfirth Harriers in tribute to Ian Roberts who had been killed by lightning in the Dolomites a year previously. Ian was not only a top class fell runner, but also a formidable competitor in road races, and it was therefore decided to include both fell and road running in this race, the first and third laps consisting of about four miles of road and the second and fourth laps consisting of around four miles of country and fell. However, any road runners who turned up expecting an ordinary flat course must have got a shock, for, as my Clayton clubmate, fell runner Bob Mitchell, who ran the road section, remarked the uphill was just like a fell race ascent, though the downhill part was very fast indeed.

From Marsden Cricket Club, the aptly named Mount Road was followed up onto the moors near Standedge, whence the A62 road led back down to the Colne valley - to be followed by a gruelling uphill slog back

the cricket club. The same venue was used for the fell race, which initially followed the southern edge of the adjacent golf course to eventually cross Mount Road and climb to the summit of Pule Hill (1,179'), whence a circuit of the moor brought competitors back to the road crossing to retrace the outward route around the golf course.

It was perhaps fitting that the race should be won by the host club. The fastest road legs were run by G Ellis (Holmfirth) 20.30, Richard May (ASVAC) 20.33, and M Irvine (Leeds University) 20.57, while John Wilde (RAF Cosford) 20.58, Jeff Norman 22.14 and Harry Walker 22.24 recorded the best times on the fell section. 31 teams finished, plus two incomplete teams, and conditions were overcast, but clear after a light rain earlier in the afternoon.

Again the Dales were blessed with fine sunny weather for the 40th running of the amateur event, going back to 1932 (1903 was the first recorded professional race). It seems the weather is always fine for the race, at least in recent years, but the programme shows that this was not always the case. The 1954 record reads "no race (green flooded)". "Divels - prepared to the state of the state o

After the cyclists, road runners and junior fell runners had had their turns, the classic race was underway promptly at 5 p.m. with the warmth of the afternoon sun just starting to decline and only the hang gliders for competing attention.

One man dominated the race - Mike Short. He led the 140 strong field to the summit and held off all challenges in the downhill dash back to the green. Behind him positions changed dramatically as Harry Walker, second at the summit, slipped to 5th place, and Billy Bland gave everyone a demonstration of descent fell running to come from behind to pass all but Mike. Harry told me after the race that he had put everything he had into the ascent and had nothing left to stave off the downhill attack.

For Mike this was his third victory in the race which gives him the best record in recent times. One has to go back to the late '60s to find the amazing series of victories by Pete Watson to find a better record of performances. Mike's time(13.35) is the slowest winning time since Watson's days, which taken together with Brian Robinson's time of 13.14 last year and Ricky Wilde's record of 12.50 in 1977, indicates that the new course (first run in 1979) is longer/slower.

The new course, which takes a different route on the ascent and descent thereby avoiding interference, is, I feel, a definite improvement, although it makes the final ascent less rugged and steep.

Regrettably there is no ladies' race. Perhaps this is the way the event should develop? A good entry (40+) in the boys race (12 to 15 years), who run to the Fell Gate and back, should ensure the continuation of this popular event. Dominated by Yorkshire lads (where were you Cumbria and Lancashire?), the race was won by Nick Horn from Holmfirth in 6.59.

BEN NEVIS

by Roger Boswell*

Category A, 12 miles, 4400

6 September

It was extremely wet and very windy in Fort William on Saturday 6th September. Mr McLaren was getting agitated and a little worried. He was supposed to be at the top of Ben Nevis as he was the Summit Judge for the 1980 Ben Nevis race, but here he was, still far from the top, struggling up the windswept path with the race due to start any moment.

Meanwhile, down below in the town park, the organisers were getting similarly agitated. The anticipated radio message confirming McLaren's presence at the summit failed to materialise. In fact no radio calls were heard from the summit. The two RAYNET men (RAYNET is an organisation which provides emergency radio communications, made up of amateur radio enthusiasts) who had volunteered for summit duty had radio'd in to say they were at half way and were going no further. It transpired that the summit party, including Mr McLaren and radio equipped mountain rescue members, never made it to the top either. Their Sno-Trac had broken down, and they had insufficient time to get up.

Poor Alistair McIntyre. As chairman of the Ben Nevis Race Association, who organise the race, he was in the unenviable position at 2.00 p.m. with 400 runners lined up on the start line and still no word from the summit. He announced that the race was postponed for at least 10 minutes. Then at about 2.05 p.m. he extended this to half an hour. Finally at about 2.30 p.m. he made the following announcement, "The police and medical authorities, taking note of conditions on the hill as reported by the mountain rescue, advise us that anyone getting into difficulties would be dead within 25 minutes. Gentlemen, we cannot take that chance with your lives. The 1980 Ben Nevis race is cancelled."



A shorter substitute race was not considered. Requests for a post-ponement till Sunday was refused on the grounds that the BNRA could not organise the necessary rescue and medical parties at such short notice.

Peter Brooks, veteran fell runner and member of the Fell Runners' Association executive committee, was interviewed by a reporter for BBC's Radio Highland station, minutes after the cancellation announcement. He said that the decision must rest with those on the hill, but he doubted whether they were aware of the sort of weather conditions fell runners were used to running in. In

reply to a question about the survival time of only 25 minutes, he said that was a risk most fell runners were prepared to take. He also said that it was unfortunate that the BNRA had accepted entries from so many non fell runners; he considered two-thirds of the total entry to be inexperienced hill runners.

Many runners ran half way as a training run(the mountain rescue counted 138), and 9 went to the top, including - inevitably - Fort William's Eddie Campbell, going for his 30th Ben race, and Peter Brooks. Brooks said that conditions from half way to the top got no worse than at half way, and most runners said they did not consider conditions they encountered at half way bad enough to warrant cancellation of the race.

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

There are plenty of rumours about the real reason for cancelling the race, and I suppose everyone will have their own pet theory. What if the Sno-Trac had not broken down and the officials had reached the summit – would it have been run then? We will never know, of course, but it is a pity that the issue is not more clear-cut.

It was certainly a great and expensive disappointment to the 400 frustrated competitors. A fortnight afterwards I asked some of those who had travelled up for the event for their comments:

John Blair-Fish (Edinburgh Southern)

"There is no option but to call it off if the mountain rescue say they cannot rescue. But should they be in a position to say that? If the runners had to carry proper equipment it would perhaps be different."

Colin Donnelly (Cambuslang)

"They were quite right to call it off. A lot of inexperienced people do the race and it was so slippy I'm sure there would have been broken limbs."

Ian Holloway (Rochdale)

"It was a wise decision, particularly from the casual fell runner's point of view. Obviously I was very disappointed."

Ken Taylor (Rossendale)

"Naturally, I was extremely disappointed, but it was a wise decision.

I went up to the Red Burn and it was desperate. But why couldn't they have run to half way or used the next day?"

Geoff Gough (Blackburn)

"I'd been really building up for it. They were right to cancel, but they should have put on another race - half way up or on the valley road - just something to get over the disappointment."

Harry Jarrett (Cumberland Fell Runners' Association)

"I went half way up and I reckon they should definitely have run the Half-Nevis. It wasn't good enough to do the full Ben, but there was no thought for the runners and their disappointment. I spent over £150 with nothing to show."

Billy Bland (Keswick) (who did'the diet' for the event - see interview)

Cost is something the runners mentioned a lot. Most people reckon it cost them at least £50 to make the weekend - some reckon to have shelled out £150 all told. A refund of the entry fee was an issue which came up too. There seems to be some confusion about refunds. The local paper reported that runners had been offered their entry fee back and also that most did not want to accept a refund. have not met or heard of anyone who has been offered a refund - let alone turned one down! - but the organisers are apparently going to inform people about it with next year's entry forms.

Life works and Dive I have medical this VAUX MOUNTAIN TRIAL by Don Talbot

O-type, Category A, 15-20 miles, 5000'-10000'

14 September

The programme for this year's mountain trial suggested that if we had a wet September there may be difficulty in parking. On Saturday 13 September it poured down all day, so it wasn't surprising to see waterlogged fields on our journey north on the Sunday morning. The Rothay had burst its banks at Rydal and I have never seen so many flooded fields at Grange in Borrowdale. So what was in store for us at Stonethwaite? As it turned out, apart from a little flood water on the approach track, the parking field was amazingly dry.

The weather was true to forecast and remained dry and rather warm in sheltered places. With clear views all round, it was a good day for being in the hills. Unfortunately, it did start raining towards the end of the afternoon for some of the late finishers and for the marshals who had to pack up.

It was obvious from the start that the course was going to be rather a tough one, as the winning times will show. I have been assured that the men's course was "only" 18.9 miles as the crow flies, with 8300' of climbing, unless you were like me and put in the extra distance round Sty Head and Sprinkling Tarn to avoid that climb onto Glaramara. The course was planned to be tough, with perhaps as high as 25% drop out rate by the time of checkpoint 3. In the event, however, only 21% dropped out and not all because of being timed out on Glaramara, perhaps the good weather conditions affected this calculation. It was obviously designed for the "hard men" but with such a high completion rate, there must be a lot of hard men about!

There was a very creditable performance by the ladies. Their course was again quite tough and interesting with good geographical features

and with accent on route choice. It was planned at 11.4 miles as the crow flies, with $6,750^{\circ}$ of climbing. One young lady I spoke to put in extra distance and completed 16 miles, but allowing for taking the optimum line, I suppose an extra $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles is quite acceptable.

Thanks to the LDMTA for an interesting and taxing event and especially to the Secretary's husband for labouring round the course on Saturday in torrential rain to ensure that the checkpoints were adequately marked and presumably to check that no one had made off with Haystacks, Glaramara or Base Brown!

If you would like to peruse the course on the map appended are the checkpoints. The start was from Longthwaite Youth Hostel, with the finish at Stonethwaite farm. There were 3 common controls at Glaramara, 8lea Tarn and the Bridge. Competitors arriving at checkpoint 3 after 1500 hrs were to be timed out.

As part of a longer letter on the Fell Runner of the Year Championship Mick Garrett writes of the Vaux(which is not counted):
"Fell running is about the successful crossing of mountainous terrain at speed which must involve navigation to some degree or other. A champion fell runner must be adept at all the skills required, not just athletic ability. I would be the first to admit however that such competitions must be made fair. Two possible improvements would be to keep the venue secret until the 11th hour and to have seeded runners going off first and at longer intervals(5 minutes)! It would not matter so much if competitors unlikely to finish in the first thirty went off more closely and in groups afterwards (ten a minute)!"

I woke before 7, breakfasted and motored on A66 at 90 km.p.h. I parked on a muddy field as directed. I had my kit checked and got my number bib: must return it. I organised my equipment - mostly food - into my cag. I proceeded towards Longthwaite between puddles. I lost my map: Jack Bloor found it.
I was glad my map was transpasealed.
I did not expect any other way than up Dale Head Tarn. I was chuffed at No. 1 being Littledale Reservoir.

I had no route choice to make: auto-pilot to 1. I moved with purpose up to Dale Head Tarn. I heard heavy breathing: John Broxap passed me. I ran nicely through 1, over col and down to Gatesgarth. I climbed up to Scarth Gap directissima, and remet Ned Paul (Tourist path). I saw some Dark Peak lads picnicing on Haystacks. I made a mid-course correction and ran a la Ennerdale to Green Gable. I was encouraged by keeping pace with M Gilbert, J Blair-Fish, etc. I was further encouraged by passing a walking Walkington + dog I contoured Green Gable to Sty Head and recall running up here. I had been going three hours and walked up to Sprinkling Tarn. I had no food left and had not reached Glaramara yet. I had just fresh air and water to survive on: could I do it? I let Ken Ledward pass me, got a twinge of cramp and made Glaramara I spastically descended to Langstrath: was Mike Walford retiring? I climbed slowly up to High Raise mass with an engineer, director, and ex-GB international (all one man). I ran/walked to Codale Tarn: checkers cheerful, I felt grim. I received Dextrosol at Ash Crags off another ex-GB international

I contoured Ullscarf to arrive at Blea Tarn relieved. I rested and chatted with Boyd Millen: nearly home now. I did not mention today's race and just assumed Billy Bland had won. I struggled on to Stonethwaite, raising a gallop at dusk.

I finished the Vaux Mountain Trial in 109th place.

The weather was not kind for this year's Moffat - mist, rain and high winds. Ideal, one felt for Lochaber's Ros Coates; but she didn't run this time, to the relief of the ten or so ladies that did. However, Fiona Hinde, making her fell running debut, ensured that Lochaber finished well up the results sheet. Fiona led for much of the way before Wendy 'Distance' Dodds went through to win. Fiona just got the better of Ann Marie Grindley to take second place.

In the men's race, tachaber's Runnie 'Cammie' Campbell must have been the only runner not to carry a cagoule (he hasn't got one); he only wore a vest because his mother said she'd stop his pocket money if he didn't. But that apart, Cammie made no mistakes. For guys who don't know what a compass is (e.g. anyone named Campbell), success in misty conditions can only be achieved by picking out a proven orienteer and hanging on to him at all costs. This is one department where Cammie knows his onions; in this instance Peter Haines. Cammie stayed with Haines all the way round until the very last checkpoint, where he said 'goodbye' and went tearing off to victory - in theory. In practice, he said 'goodbye'and went tearing off in the wrong direction. So justice was done in the end - Pete Haines ran out a worthy winner, with Ray Aucott 2nd and Cammie 3rd.

There are seven checkpoints in the race, pre-race favourites Billy Bland and Colin Donnelly reached the fifth checkpoint with an incredible 20 minute lead over the 3rd man (partly due to the original chasing bunch of John McGee, John Gough and Ken Taylor, having already gone off course in the mist). But the leading duo's titanic battle for supremacy petered out in the wind and rain as they failed completely to locate the sixth checkpoint - Bland dropped cut (well after all, what was he running for - he was already winner of the Fell Runners' championship) and Donnelly finished 30th.


At checkpoint 4, runners had to ford a fast flowing burn. Peter Brooks tried the 'Walking on Water' method. Boldly he stepped where no runner had gone before, and disappeared into about seven feet of icy water, clutching a piece of Kendal Mint Cake he had aquired only seconds earlier. He clambered out again some five yards downstream, minus the cake and swearing profusely. The race marshals, who had not had much to laugh about in the miserable conditions, were vastly amused.

O.K., Dieter Wolf and Leonard Suter won again, experienced pairs Walford and Naylor, Forrest and Phillipson were highly placed, and the most successful women were Ros Coates (with David Rosen) in elite and those seasoned campaigners Carol McNeill and Wendy Dodds in A class.

BUT what about Robert and Roger Bloor taking the elite runners up spot and John and Simon Baston first home in A class? Who could now argue that years of experience are essential, or that only those well beyond their student days have developed the mental toughness to cope with the rigours of K.I.M.M.? Who indeed could now argue that brothers don't get on well together? In fact, it could well be that brothers have a goodly measure of the perception of each other that this year's planners, Mike Gilbert and Joe Sherriff, believe so important.

It had been hinted by Mike and Joe that K.I.M.M.'80 would be no pushover. In respect of atmospheric conditions the Isle of Arran was kind indeed, for it rained on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, but not a drop fell during the day on either day, although on Day Two the cloud base was down to about 1000'. The same could not be said about conditions under-foot. The wet conditions generally, combined with the peat bogs, tufted grass and heather made for little runnable terrain and much tiring and frustrating going.

The elite course was laid out on the rugged mountainous northern half of the island with overnight camp near Lochranza and both days demanding careful route choice to minimise the climbing. A course was over much the same terrain, whilst B and C were routed south on the less rugged, but in many respects (peat bogs in particular) more difficult and frustrating terrain.

At the end of the two days there was no disputing who were masters of the event. The organisers, planners, the weather and Arran may have combined to break the spirit of many, but the Swiss pair of Wolf and Suter seemingly revelled in the conditions, to accumulate nearly an hour or about 9% clear of the runners-up, the Bloor brothers.

This year's annual event was run on the fells to the south of Ennerdale water and to the west of the 2000' Iron Crag, on another new 1:25000

black and white map from that prolific lakeland mapper, Pete Nelson. The start involved a steep climb from the lakeside onto the high fells and into light mist. Thereafter the gradients were modest until the steep drop back to the finish at the Scout Camp. The seven control point course took competitors over or round Lank Rigg, down to the head of Worm Gill, up Long Grain towards Iron Crag to pick up the 5th control (3rd on the short course), then back via the forest by the summit of Grike. The long course was reckoned to be 10 miles as the crow flies and 3200'of climbing and took the winner, Peter Haines, 1.53.09.

The longest out, at the back of the 66 finishers, were out around 4 hours and more than ready for the hot soup, tea, bread and cakes, served up by the ladies of Cumberland Fell Runners.

Danny Hughes planned the course and achieved plenty of route choice and the leaders came from those who combine the best navigational and fell running ability. Last year's winner Billy Bland, Jos Naylor and Mike Walford had to be content with 20th, 11th(1st veteran) and 12th places respectively this year, as Peter Haines was followed by Roger Bloor and Tony Richardson.

Ladies Vicky Mason (34th) and Bridget Hogge (54th) who like many of the men was feeling the effects of the Blisco Dash the day before, or the Cumberland Fell Runners' Association Dinner the previous evening (or both!), put up a creditable performance. Cumberland Fell Runner I Donaldson won the shorter course in 1.42.42.
